
Walking through history

The town which lies next to the Lippe was first documented in 1017, and in 1289 it was granted city rights. In 1554, Haltern's merchants joined the Hanseatic League (until 1611) and built their first town hall from 1575 to 1577, which today is the seat of the Tourist Information. In the 19th century, the town gradually grew beyond its medieval fortification, from which the "Siebenteufelsturm" (1502) was preserved. After the secularization and the end of the Napoleonic wars Haltern became part of the Prussian province of Westphalia and gained with the construction of the waterworks (1908) and the water reservoir (1930) also regional importance. Even the Romans left their footprints during the Germanic campaigns in Haltern. At the site of a former camp, the LWL-Römermuseum and the Roman Park Aliso give a vivid insight into the life of the invaders in this region.
